Dear Members of Temple Emanuel,

As a member of the Christian faith, I have always held the belief that the Jewish people are the "apple of God's eye." A sacred people with a rich heritage of tradition and faith. I traveled to Jerusalem to learn and discover this faith for myself. It was the most amazing experience, and I came back to Huntersville, NC with even more appreciation for the Jewish tradition and customs.

I watch the news and speak with my Jewish friends here and in Israel, and my heart breaks witnessing the complete antisemitism I am observing. I never in a million years would have thought that we would see this in America. I'm praying for those affected by the horrors on Oct. 7, for the ignorance I am seeing on college campuses and the wars being fought against the epitome of evil.

All this to say, I have your back. I love you and will continue to speak truth. My God, Your God will protect and guide you.



The program explores the variety and diversity of Jewish life and culture and includes a multi-week stay in Israel and several week-long



sessions in the US. Daniel has formed close bonds with many young Jewish adults from the entire country and has also developed bonds with his Israeli counterparts. Daniel will matriculate at Brown University in the fall.



Adult Education Series: Presentation by Suly Chenkin, Holocaust Survivor

We were so lucky to have Suly Chenkin, born in Kovno, Lithuania in 1941, join us on Memorial Day weekend to share her experiences during and after World War II—early childhood in the Kovno Ghetto, a daring escape alone at age 3 ½, hiding from the Nazis, arrival in Palestine at age 5 ½, followed by the nearly unbelievable reunion with her mother and then her father in Cuba. Mrs. Chenkin shared a video in which she recounted the story of her life, accompanied by photos from the time, including of herself and her family. A Q&A period followed. A truly inspiring speaker, Mrs. Chenkin urged her listeners, despite all the horrors she lived through, to live a life that focuses on the good in the world.
