#### **Report from our Rabbi Search Committee**

For over two years our committee has been developing and executing a strategy to hire a full-time rabbi who will live in Gaston County.

The good news is we are well on our way as our congregation grows in members and vitality.

Twenty new families/individuals joined the Temple since October, we're building a Conversion Program with support from Temple Israel, our Adult Education programs fill the Board Room, Barbara Blau is editing our revived newsletter, Peter Blau is organizing an ongoing movie series, our Social Activities Committee is again conducting engaging regular events, Sisterhood is restructuring and will soon be at full throttle, and our Religious School has doubled its enrollment in the past year under the capable leadership of Morah Rochelle Wilensky.

And, at the heart of our continuing growth are regular minyans at Friday night services. In fact, we need more siddurim and are planning a campaign to raise funds to acquire them.

With new energy and engagement, along with Gaston County's growing population, we think our congregation will have the membership, programming, and funds to hire a full-time rabbi in several years.

Which brings us back to our search.

For the foreseeable future we will continue to be lay-led with Bill Marx, Bill Gross, and Rabbi Ya'akov Walker presiding over Shabbat services and Charlie Brown leading Passover seders and High Holiday services.

While most of you know the two Bills and Charlie, you may not have met Rabbi Ya'akov. Recently ordained in the Karaite Jewish tradition, he is a warm, committed, and scholarly leader who brings great joy and energy to our pulpit. He is an active member of Hebrew Family Synagogue in Charlotte, Temple Israel, and our shul.

With these resources in place, we are now working with the Small Congregation Clergy Collaborative of the Union of Reform Judaism to recruit a rabbi or cantor one weekend a month to lead Shabbat services, teach Religious School, conduct adult education, and

advise temple leadership as we prepare to recruit a full-time rabbi. We are noworganizing interviews and by the time we gather for our Annual Meeting (in May or June)we expect to know if we will contract a visiting rabbi or cantor.As there is a long road ahead and many issues to consider we invite you to ask usquestions and share your suggestions.Lee BuchananBill MarxMark EpsteinLyn FoxBill GrossJason Gluck

#### A Bit of History



#### Meet the Temple's Most Famous Member: Marshall Rauch

Perhaps you've seen the sign on I-85 approaching Gastonia from the east: Senator Marshall Rauch Freeway. That's **our** Marshall Rauch, who's just celebrated his 101<sup>st</sup> birthday, that they named the freeway after.

Just Google his name and you'll see Marshall's many accomplishments. Politician: 12-term North Carolina State Senator. Businessman: world's #1 manufacturer of satin and glass Christmas ornaments. College athlete: played basketball on Duke's 1941-1942 Southern Conference championship team. Combat veteran: served in World War II.

But we're here to talk about Temple Emanuel and Gastonia's small but active Jewish community over the 80 years he's been here. We spoke with him earlier this month at his cozy, memorabilia-filled apartment in Gastonia's Covenant Village. Here's an excerpt; more to come in future newsletters.

**TEMPLE NEWSLETTER:** Marshall, you're a native New Yorker who came to study at Duke, where you met your late wife, Jeanne. She was from Bessemer City, just a few miles west of here. Tell us about moving to Gaston County in the 1940s.

**MARSHALL**: Jeanne's parents [Frank and Sadie Goldberg] gave me a job in their textile business. Then Jeanne and I lived in her mother's home, and we had perfect everything, for about a year.

When Jeanne was pregnant, we decided we were going to move out. We moved to Gastonia. After all, I had a job. I believe I was making \$15,000 a year – that was good, then. Mortgage on the house, I can remember, was 54 dollars and 54 cents.

TEMPLE NEWSLETTER: What was Gastonia like at the time?

**MARSHALL:** We moved from Bessemer City – which really was a small, old town. Even Gastonia only had a population of 30 or 40 thousand at the time.

But the Temple was there...it was established. If you were Jewish and you were around here, you joined the Temple. It was a good gathering place. And it was good because it was a community.

**TEMPLE NEWSLETTER**: Why did you choose Gastonia versus Charlotte, where there's a much bigger Jewish community? Did you feel isolated?

**MARSHALL**: Jeanne had a sister and two brothers who lived in Gastonia. So, we never even thought about it. There was a place for us here. We did well here.

**TEMPLE NEWSLETTER:** At its peak, let's say late 60s, early 70s, how many families were in the Temple?

**MARSHALL:** I can remember when there were 60 or 70 families. Now maybe half of that. EDITOR'S NOTE: TEMPLE NOW HAS OVER 70 FAMILY AND INDIVIDUAL MEMBERS. A lot of this is because today the merchants are gone [downtown Gastonia retail shop owners who were Jewish]. But now we do have professionals...doctors and dentists, lawyers, executives. Good people.

**TEMPLE NEWSLETTER:** What about the new families moving into Gaston County as suburban Charlotte expands westward? In fact, over the past six months, we added 20 new members, and two more families are in the process of joining.

**MARSHALL**: Today Gastonia is a city because Charlotte is there. Many of our members and friends work in Charlotte. The Temple is growing.

**TEMPLE NEWSLETTER**: What would you say to Jews in the process of moving here about why they should consider living in Gaston County and joining the Temple?

**MARSHALL:** Our Temple's over 100 years old and everybody's proud of it. Our children have all been Bar and Bat Mitzvah there. I think the Gentile friends are proud of the fact that we have this fine old Temple, too. And it looks like we're just in the beginning of growth.

#### Statement on the Israeli-Gaza War Gaston Interfaith Trialogue, January 23, 2023

Not since 9/11, have our hearts been as troubled and our conversations as difficult as now. Following the attacks on Israel by Hamas, and the bombardment by Israel of Gaza, we are numb, yet called to speak. There are things we, as Christians, Jews, and Muslims, need to speak *against*, and things we need to speak *for*.

First, what we must speak against:

We speak against using these events to promote anti-Semitism. Israel has a right to self-defense and a responsibility to protect all its citizens – Jewish, Muslim, and Christian. The Israeli government is not to be equated with all Jews, nor are Jews to be equated with the Israelí government.

We speak against using these events to promote Islamophobia. The Palestinian people both Muslim and Christian have legitimate aspirations. All Palestinians are not to be equated with any terrorist organization or any other political/military group.

We speak against using these events to pit Jews against Muslims, and Muslims against Jews. Through the centuries, Jews and Muslims have often made sacrifices to protect each other. The fight over boundaries and territories in the Middle East is not an excuse for any faith group to promote itself over others.

We therefore are called to speak out for the following:

**The right of all civilians to live in peace.** All communities must reject extremists in their midst. And no group or nation should deliberately target civilians - to protect itself, or to promote its security or cause.

**The need for proportionality and restraint in warfare.** War is always a last resort in the cause of peace and justice. Collateral damage and civilian casualties must always be considered and avoided if possible. The need for an immediate cease-fire to attend to humanitarian needs, should never be taken off the table, by any party.

The necessity for a long-term solution. The division of territories in the Middle East has been a continuous source of discord for all parties - Jews, Muslims, and Christians. All residents of this area should be able to live in peace and worship as people of faith and recognize the rights of each to exist. Whether through a Two-State Solution, a Single State, or other options, we need all the nations of the world to work together to find a way forward. Perhaps coming together in empathy and respect in this crisis is what the world needs to achieve a lasting peace there and here at home.

The members of our faith communities are determined to respond to this crisis not with name-calling and division, but with prayer, heartbreak, and honest discussion. The greatest tragedy would be to allow current events to destroy the good work and goodwill our communities have built. May this time of testing see the bonds that unite us only strengthened, and the faith and hope we share only deepened - as we all seek to live our lives as God's children, until God's peaceable kingdom fully comes.
