Recent Legacy Gifts

In recent months we've received planned gifts from individuals who generously remembered the Temple in their estate plans. The Board would like to share their stories with you.

Deane C. Griffin

Many of us remember Deane as the woman from Lincolnton who wore jaunty berets, rarely met a stranger, had a green thumb, and loved being Jewish. She converted in 1983 under the guidance of our late rabbi, Israel Gerber, and over the years was a member of our congregation and the Hickory Jewish Center. Long before her death in July 2024, Deane made our Temple a beneficiary of her estate. In anticipation of receiving these funds, our Board has established the Deane C. Griffin Conversion Fund and will allocate a portion of her forthcoming bequest to help underwrite our Conversion Program, which is now serving its second cohort of students. (Please see p. 3 for more about the Conversion Program.) Given Deane's joy in Judaism, we believe she would wholeheartedly endorse this use of her funds. And we are eternally grateful.

Jan Devine

While it had been a few years since we last saw her, Jan cared deeply about our Temple. A laboratory technician with a deep love of animals, gardening, drawing, and painting, Jan was often quiet and always astute. She converted to Judaism in upstate New York, many years ago. Soon after her passing in January 2024, we learned she made a generous bequest to our congregation. As our Board decides how best to use her unrestricted gift, we remember her strong faith and her commitment to strengthening our Temple.

Alice Arkin

While many of us did not know Alice, she was a steady, long-time friend of our Temple. A member of First Presbyterian Church, Gastonia, she was married to Joel, a Temple member who died in 1998. Since then, and without fail, Alice sent us monthly checks in memory of her beloved husband. A retired teacher with a ready smile and a warm personality, Alice was a native of Gastonia who loved to read, garden, and care for feral cats in her neighborhood. After her death in December 2024, Andy Osborne, along with the executor of her estate, arranged a gift of undesignated funds to Temple Emanuel, consistent with her giving history. We are using this gift to upgrade our security system. Our Temple gratefully acknowledges Alice's enduring generosity to our congregation.

Conversion News!



Our second conversion class is now underway! Eight (yes, eight!) students are currently completing *Introduction to Judaism*, an online course offered by the Union for Reform Judaism. This overview of Jewish theology and practice is our prerequisite for taking our homegrown course - 18 Weeks to a New Life in Torah - developed by Rabbi Ya'akov Walker. Rabbi Ya'akov, Mark Epstein, and Bill Gross will teach 18 Weeks in biweekly sessions at Temple starting on January 11, 2026. The third part of our conversion class is learning to read Hebrew with congregant and lay leader Bill Marx, which will also start in the new year.

After completing this three-part program, each conversion candidate will stand before a Bet Din at Charlotte's Temple Israel. This religious court, composed of three learned individuals, will interview each candidate and determine whether they are ready to become a Jew by Choice. Those accepted into the covenant will immerse in Temple Israel's mikveh. Their conversions will be recognized by both the Conservative and the Reform Movements. A joyous Shabbat service during which the new members of our Jewish family have their first aliyah is the bridge from the successful completion of over a year of study to a lifelong journey as a member of B'nai Israel.

If you attended the recent Shabbat service celebrating Allison Kanipe, Clark Simon, and Claudia Dorfman - who completed our first conversion class and stood successfully before their Bet Din in October - you know how meaningful the entire process is and how wonderful it is to welcome those who choose to join the Jewish People. Please look forward to being introduced to our eight new sojourners at Shabbat services over the coming months.

As shared on page 2, thanks to a generous contribution the Board has established the Deane C. Griffin Conversion Fund to help underwrite program expenses. Students in our conversion class pay tuition based

on a sliding fee; their payments will revert to the Conversion Fund so that we can offer the program over the years to come.














Upcoming Community Events in the Greater Gaston Area: Learn, Participate, Celebrate, Support
